FCR School wants parents to Be concerned about vaping

Forest City Regional School Board was advised that "vaping" is a serious problem at Forest City Regional and is going to be addressed further in the future. Supt. Dr. Jessica Aquilina said "parents are in denial" that this new type of smoking is a problem.

Dr. Aquilina said a recent

program at the school on the dangers of vaping was poorly attended by parents. She said parents must partner with the school to address this growing issue. She said vaping has become more serious than nicotine smoking.

She said the school is looking at a mandatory meeting with parents if a student has a second violation of the vaping policy. She said the District has ordered test strips which are used to determine if oil residue in vaping pipes is an allowable substance and not a controlled substance.


